MHSO Presents at the TDSB Secondary School Symposium

On May 8, 2012, Dora Nipp (MHSO Board Member), Vanessa Tamburro (Education Programme Officer) and Sarah Warner (Outreach Coordinator) led *The Ties that Bind Workshop*, which took place within the context of the TDSB Secondary School Symposium. 60 students from a variety of schools from the Toronto District School Board (TDSP) learned how to analyze primary source materials related to Chinese Canadian

workers on the Canadian Pacific Railway (CPR). Through the guided analysis of historical photographs and oral history interviews, history came alive for the students. One student remarked, "the pictures were a good way of knowing about the real life of the Chinese in Canada" and another student expressed that the oral histories were deeply moving and revealed another side of history not always explored in the classroom.

AAO Consultants assess the MHSO Archives



Please donate today to ensure that Ontario's multicultural history is safely preserved In February and April, the MHSO Archives hosted Carolynn Bart-Riedstra, Archives Advisor, and Iona McCraith, Preservation Consultant from the **Archives Association of Ontario** to assess the MHSO's archives. Commended for his commitment to caring for the collections and his knowledge of the MHSO's vast holdings, MHSO archivist Pasang Thackchhoe was praised as "a walking finding aid."

Nevertheless, McCraith and Bart-Riedstra recommended describing the collections as a fonds-level system as well as at the series-level to align with archival standards, in order to make descriptions of the collection available on ARCHEION thereby increasing access to our holdings; and storing the collections in proper preservation containers, including acid-free Hollinger boxes.
